New Year



First Report - Analytical Framework

WP2 leaders Maritime Institute in Gdansk took the helm in February with the delivery of the Analytical Framework required by the end of the month. This is an interdisciplinary framework for the analysis of multi-use in the sea basin context. This has provided the project consortium with practical research tools that will enable theoretical understanding and practical experiences related to multi-use. The analytical framework will also guide further analysis and feed into WP3. Based on an overview of existing literature on multi-use, this scheme includes key research questions and incorporates previous studies and practical experiences on multi-use. The Project

The Multi-Use in European Seas (MUSES) project is a two-year Horizon 2020 funded project, running from November 2016 to October 2018, exploring the opportunities for Multi-Use in European Seas across five sea basins: Baltic Sea, North Sea, Mediterranean Sea, Black Sea and, the Eastern Atlantic

Three main work packages

As well as WP's 1, 5 & 6 (<u>Project Management</u>, <u>Dissemination</u> and <u>Ethics</u> respectively) the MUSES project has 3 main pillars:

- Sea Basin Overview of Multi-Uses (WP2): Regional overviews of multi-use which take into account 5 EU sea basins will be based on an analytical framework to facilitate adoption of a common approach across the sea basins.
- 2. <u>Case Studies</u> (WP3): MUSES will assess potential synergies for multi-use as well as the challenges encountered through a series of case studies.
- 3. Action Plan (WP4): MUSES will develop an action plan to ascertain the real opportunities for multi-use in European Seas, including the scope for innovation and Blue Growth potential. The action plan will be developed actively with stakeholders.

The action plan will be one of the main deliverables of the MUSES project. Substantial effort will therefore be made to produce a well-designed, easy-to-read, comprehensive printed document, which shall be promoted extensively beyond the lifetime of the project itself.
